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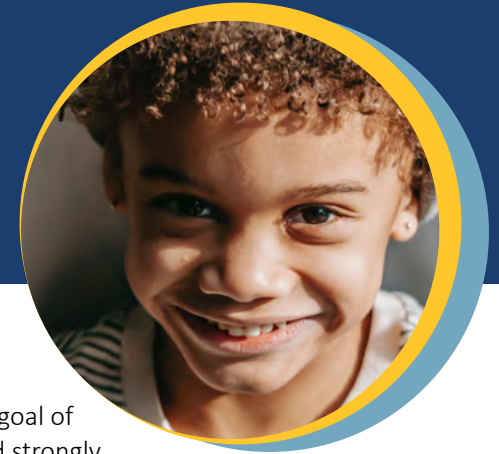
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Leadership Message

Children First in Action

Child, Youth, Family and Community Well-Being

As we operate in a culture where we are always learning, collaborating, and embracing ways to improve our service delivery and planning, we are finding ways to listen and act upon the voices of children, youth and families. This fiscal year, the CCASH has held child, youth, family and community well-being at the forefront as we launched a new conference planning model within the Agency. Voices of youth are actively being sought during independence planning. Along with the voice of the youth, it is vital that we understand their identity and how that can work in tandem with planning for appropriate care. Kadie, a youth who has been in and out of care since four years old, expresses the significance of being placed in a culturally appropriate home and how working with the Agency made a difference.

“

I moved to Canada from Africa when I was four years old. Initially, I was transitioned into a different home with an alternate caregiver from age five to 12 before my mom passed away. After my mom died, I was moved into a foster home until I turned 16. My workers and I identified that it would be better for me to be in a more culturally matched home with fellow Black-African people, so I was then moved to another home. This experience made me feel like my needs were listened to.”

“The opportunity to provide kin care came to us when our daughter was no longer able to provide a safe living environment for her child. We knew that as parents, we wanted to help our child, and as grandparents we wanted to make sure that our grandson had a place to call home. The CCASH approached us initially, and while we didn’t have much hesitation, we knew that it would be a large undertaking. It is important for people in the community to know that the CCASH worked closely with our family to help this transition be as smooth as possible, especially for our grandson. While not only supporting my daughter’s recovery, they have also been a great support to us as we navigate this new dynamic in our family. At the end of the day, we are all working together with a common goal, and that is so my grandson is happy. Every child deserves to feel happy, safe and have positive childhood memories.

Quality of Care

The CCASH works to enhance the natural capacities that children and youth already embody. Our focus remains on enhancing the quality of care for the individuals that are in front of us, taking into consideration all that makes them who they are. This means that we work to ensure that the infrastructure is in place for them to accentuate who they truly are. With a higher quality of care, we can fill the gaps and be silent supporters allowing them to be successful given the barriers they face while being children in care.

This year, we were faced with an issue of having several children in need of foster care with a lack of foster families available. To address this need, the CCASH developed a public campaign which resulted in a positive increase in foster parent recruitment that our organization would not otherwise have had.

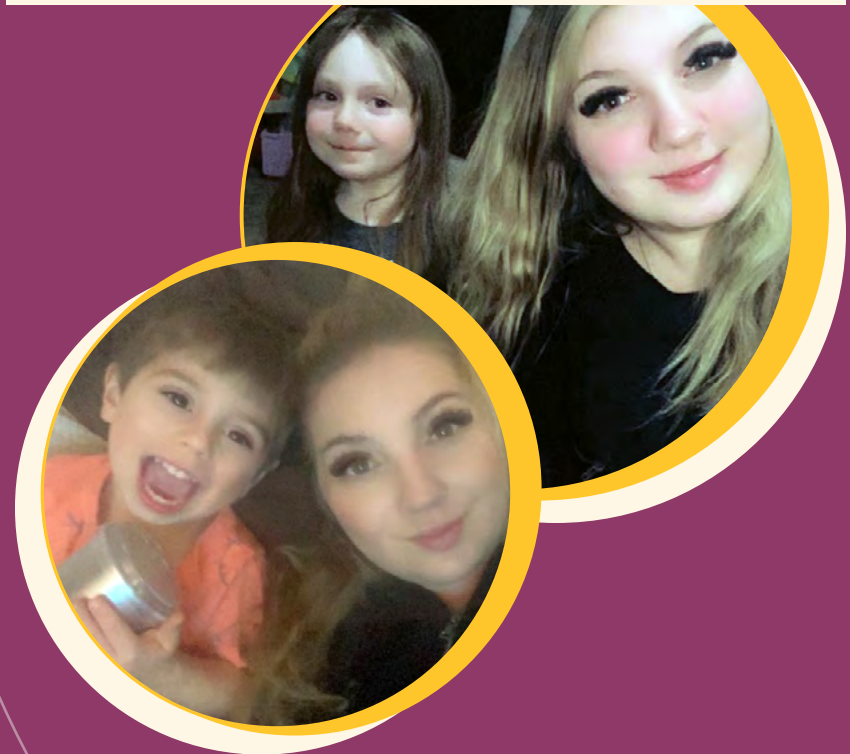
Since May 2022, the CCASH has had many individuals come forward expressing interest to learn more about fostering. We have had a total of nine families approved to foster through active recruitment. We currently have three families completing PRIDE (Parent Resources for Information, Development, and Education) and two families that will be starting the assessment process.

The CCASH has showed that not only my safety, but my child's safety is a priority when I was having issues with the father of my son, and they provided me with a cell phone, so I was able to call the police if need be. In addition to assisting in the purchase of necessities such as a car seat and crib, the CCASH has helped me with rent payments, and has provided me with a therapeutic referral for daycare. This helped me secure a daycare spot for my son and broke down the barriers that would have worked against our application. Their involvement and support have molded me into a different person, and I feel confident in my ability to keep my child safe. Their support has helped me get me and my family on a path to a better life."

The annual Golf Tournament saw another successful year with \$60,000 raised to strengthen supports available for youth aging out of care. We are grateful for the many loyal community partners like the Larsen and Preyra families, who have continued to show dedication and unwavering support over the last 13 years.





The Give the Gift of Joy Campaign raised over \$70,000 with the help of local schools and parishes coming together to raise funds. With the Diocese of Hamilton matching donations up to \$25,000, we were able to exceed our initial fundraising goal. System Accountability and Sustainability

To strengthen our practices we take into account all races, religions, creeds or sexual identities to ensure we are putting children first.

Engagement with the Indigenous community has resulted in strides made through the Heart & Spirit initiative. We have maintained the commitments made to hold ourselves accountable for colonial practices, and to improve the way we conduct service with our Indigenous community. The foundation has been set to establish the Heart & Spirit initiative as a sustainable path that will help alleviate barriers. This initiative has become a thread of our organization as we partner with the Indigenous community to develop alternative care practices that are culturally appropriate. We look forward to launching the program in the next fiscal year.

For the betterment of the children and youth in our care, we strive to remove oppression and inequities across our service system. The CCASH staff now includes a Sexual Orientation Gender Identity and Expression Lead (SOGIE). The SOGIE lead has facilitated six sessions of the OACAS SOGIE training for staff within the organization. In addition, the agency SOGIE lead has provided staff with supplementary training on Gender 101 and coordinated a community panel of trans-serving agencies to provide ongoing learning opportunities.

“At first, before we got to know the agency, we had a specific idea from our own LGBTQ+ community perspective around how the Catholic Church has treated our community in the past. We haven’t had the best experience with the church growing up, and really, when it came to our adoption experience with the CCASH we felt extremely well supported, and had a phenomenal experience right from the beginning. Our misconceptions about the agency were quickly put to rest.

Quick intervention by the CCASH was crucial to make sure that our son was able to get to adoption. I think that it was the work of some very experienced and knowledgeable and insightful protection workers to be to recognize that his birth family situation really is not going to improve and the best outcome for this child is adoption.

We work hard to make sure our son is connected in some way to his birth family. With that comes challenges, but we want to ensure that we foster those connections in a healthy way for him.

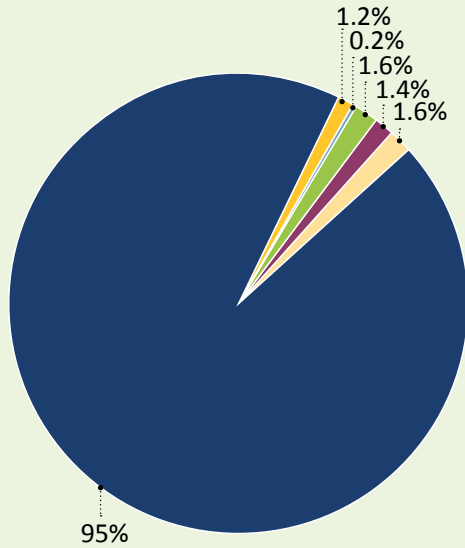

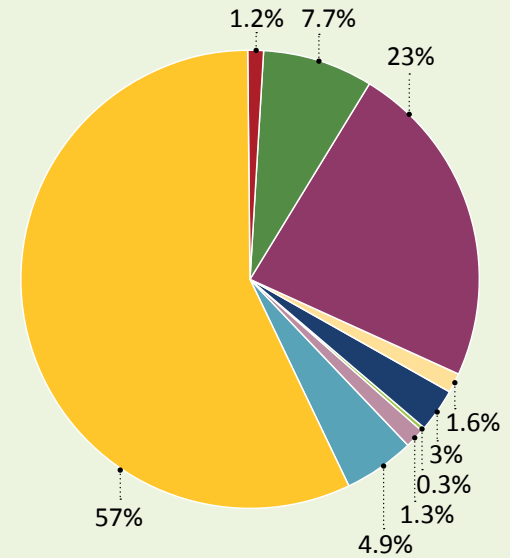

Financial Note

The Catholic Children’s Aid Society of Hamilton is reporting a deficit of \$70,093 for the fiscal year. The deficit was a result of differences in the accounting treatment of expenses for Ministerial reporting versus public sector reporting. For the purposes of financial reporting to the Ministry of Children, Community and Social Services a balanced budget was submitted.

This is a summary of details in the 2022–23 audited financial statements prepared under Public Sector Accounting Standards (PSAS) and audited by HGK Partners LLP.
